Our Mission: Our mission is to provide comprehensive early childhood education and therapeutic services to assist each child in reaching his or her highest potential.

We Serve: TLC serves children in and around Boulder County with a fully inclusive preschool and a pediatric therapy program. Our classrooms historically served children 2.5 to 5 years old but is now open to infants and toddlers. Our pediatric therapy program serves children from birth to 12 years with physical, occupational and speech therapies. Our programs are deliberately diverse, serving both typical children and children with special

Brief History: TLC Learning Center was originally founded as The Tiny Tim Center in 1956, a school for children with special needs that allowed them to live at home with their families. A pediatric therapy clinic was added as part of the Center in 1997. In 2013, the Center rebranded as TLC Learning Center to best represent our services to children of all abilities, and announced its intentions to open infant and toddler care, also for children of diverse abilities, following a renovation of two classrooms, a kitchen and the playground.

Proudest Accomplishment: Our most recent accomplishment has been completing our renovations to open our infants & toddlers program. Research states that 90 percent of brain development takes place before age 5, and we hope to deepen our impact in developing children's intellectual capacities and preparing them for success by extending our education programs to begin in infancy.

We are also proud that our staff is undergoing Pyramid Plus training, an

addressing behavior, environmental and social-emotional struggles in the classroom and in therapy sessions by looking at the whole picture of a situation and having a clear, consistent plan

Our proudest accomplishments with children come every day though, as children reach milestones both in their classrooms and pediatric therapies. These milestones can range from learning to read and write their name to learning to walk.

Greatest Need: Part of our mission is to serve children from economically disadvantaged backgrounds, and to do this we rely on scholarship donations for both our classrooms and our pediatric therapy. Children who wish to attend our education programs are able to apply for tuition assistance, which we can offer based on the suc-

effective, team-oriented approach to cess of our fund-raising efforts for scholarships. Children in need of pediatric therapy who are either without insurance or with too-little insurance can also apply for assistance to cover the costs of treatment, and this money is also dependent on our generous donors and grantors within the com-

> Future Plans: Our future plans include a successful launch of our infants & toddlers program, and continuing to grow the number of children we are able to serve every day, especially those in need of financial assistance to attend our programs. To meet this goal we continue to increase our fundraising goals and enrollment goals for children from families able to afford full tuition.


